The ETSU Arboretum comprises the entire campus and the adjacent University Woods and includes two hundred and fifty species of trees, native and exotic, in natural and cultivated landscapes. The ETSU Arboretum is a state-certified arboretum that promotes public awareness of the importance of trees in our local landscapes by providing information, planting new trees, and sponsoring other activities.

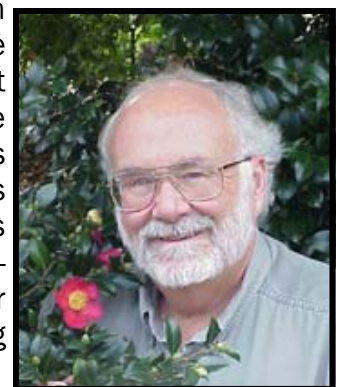

Author to Speak on Native Plants

Dr. Richard Bir will present a program on propagating native woody plants on Thursday, Sept. 21, 7:00 p.m. at the Jonesborough Visitor's Center on Boone Street. Dr. Bir has been a professional horticulturist for over 40 years, but more importantly, he is a gardener. As a faculty member in the horticulture department at North Carolina State University, his primary responsibilities have been working with county agents and nurserymen to grow better plants for the landscape. A large part of his work is devoted to seeking better ways to grow native plants. In this role, he has been director and program coordinator for the Conference on Landscaping with Native Plants (held each summer at Western Carolina University, Cullowhee, NC) and has lectured on growing native woody plants from Florida to Toronto.

Dr. Bir's writing is read world-wide. His book, *Growing and Propagating Showy Native Woody Plants*, was published by UNC Press in 1992. He is a frequent contributor to gardening magazines and trade journals including *Fine Gardening*, *American Gardener*, *NMPRO* and the *American Nurseryman*. This program, sponsored by Southern Appalachian Plant Society (SAPS) and East Tennessee Nursery Association (ETNA) is free! Everyone is invited! (1.5 CEUs)

The retention rate of Master Gardeners has greatly improved during the existence of NETMGA. In just four years, the number of active Master Gardeners has doubled! This organization is largely responsible for creating the environment that supports 150 active Master Gardeners in the Northeast Tennessee area today.

The NETMGA leadership has been encouraging the members to receive the newsletter via email. The email version just makes sense. Many organizations are moving toward an email only newsletter, which promotes conservation by saving

paper. It also saves time by minimizing the amount of preparation for "snail" mail. Time saved means more impact on other meaningful Master Gardener projects.

Everything you ever needed to know about MG reporting ...

... but were afraid to ask

Why bother to report? To become certified and to gain recertification, MGs are required to report hours each year. Continued reporting records the MG's contributions and helps substantiate the impact of the program in the region, resulting in continued funding and support by the Extension Service.

Paper or Website? Either method of recording time (paper or website) is acceptable. Use the paper report to record your time as accumulated. You can then enter the time onto the website or make a copy of the report before you turn it in. Always keep a back-up copy of your report!

Paper report: You are encouraged to submit your report as soon as you attain the minimum reporting hours. If you accumulate additional hours before the September 30th reporting deadline, send the report with these additional hours only, and mark it as such. Juana Quinones, MG Certification Officer, compiles hours submitted. Send reports to Juana at 1013 Wellington Blvd., Kingsport, TN, 37660.

Website reporting: Enter those hours as you earn them. The computer keeps the running tally. <http://mastergardeners.tennessee.edu>

Reporting Period Hours are accumulated from October 1st to September 30th. If you are using the website to report your time, you must have entered all your hours by September 30th. If you are using the paper report, your report must be received by September 30th.

REMEMBER – ALL HOURS MUST BE REPORTED BY SEPT. 30, 2006!

NORTHEAST TENNESSEE MASTER GARDENER ASSOCIATION BY-LAWS

Article II Government

Current Section III Vacancies in the Executive Board or in any committee shall be filled either by succession or appointment by the Executive Board. Such Successor or appointee shall serve for the duration of the term of the individual being replaced. New officers created in mid-term shall be appointed by the Executive Board and shall serve in that capacity until the next election.

Current Section IV Any member of the Executive Board may be removed from office by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Executive Board. Such action must then be submitted to the membership for ratification by a simple majority vote of those members present at any regular meeting.

New Section III The Executive Board shall prepare an annual budget for presentation at the regular January meeting.

Proposed revisions - Insert new Section III, move current Section III to Section IV, create Section V and move current Section IV to new Section V

Rationale: Need arose for a NETMGA budget. Moved so as to insert by-law on budget preparation for flow of instructions.

Article V Elections

Section II The Executive Board will solicit a nominating committee of three or more members in October or earlier to seek nominations. At the November Executive Board meeting, nominations may also be made from the floor for any office expiring by any Master Gardener in good standing (certified and dues paid) when the floor is open for nominations. The President or someone from the nominating committee will preside and present the nominees. The term of office shall be for one (1) calendar year, beginning in January, with the possibility of reelection for a second term if desired.

Proposed revisions - change first sentence "October" to "September" and move Section IV into Section II first sentence so as to reflect offices to be considered for the election by the Nominating Committee. Change second sentence "November Executive Board" meeting to the "regular November" meeting.

Rationale: More time is needed for a slate of officers to be nominated for the November Election. Wording did not reflect offices to be considered for election by the Nominating Committee, nor the correct meeting for election.

Article V - Section II shall now read:

The Executive Board will solicit a nomination committee of three or more members in September or earlier to seek nominations for the offices of President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and Certification Officer, all of whom shall constitute the officers of the Association and shall serve on the Executive Board in addition to all committee chairpersons.

At the regular November meeting, nominations may also be made from the floor, for any Office expiring, by any Master Gardener in good standing (certified and dues paid) when the floor is open for nominations. The President or someone from the Nominating Committee will preside and present the nominees. The term of office shall be for one (1) calendar year, beginning in January, with the possibility of reelection for a second term if desired.

Section III The annual election shall be held at the November Recognition Dinner.

Proposed revisions of Section III - change "November Recognition Dinner" to "November meeting".

Rationale: Recognition Dinner may be held at different times.
