Christy Shivell of Shy Valley Native Habitat Nursery and Herbarry will demonstrate how to make beautiful holiday wreaths on Thursday, December 1, from 9:30 a.m.-2:30 p.m. at Exchange Place. Workshop participants will craft their own unique holiday decoration from the freshest evergreens with inspiration and guidance from Christy. All materials - fresh greenery (holly, magnolia, cedar berries, pine, yew, etc.), cones, dried flowers, wreath form, and wire - will be provided. There will also be a demonstration of how to fashion a kissing ball. Participants are encouraged to bring material from their own gardens to use and to share.

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SPENDING A DAY AT EXCHANGE PLACE AT EDEN'S RIDGE

The following article was written by MG Sue Stanley who spent a day at the Fall Festival at Exchange Place.

Ever wonder what it might have been like to live on a farm in the 1850s? During the annual Fall Folk Arts Festival held September 24-25, 2011, visitors to Exchange Place Living History Farm in Kingsport were able to experience it firsthand. Exchange place is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is a great example of an early Tennessee farm.

Thanks to the many volunteers at Exchange Place, visitors could watch the blacksmith at work, pet the farm animals and walk through the actual buildings which were part of the farm during its early beginnings. There were craftspeople demonstrating their skills at various crafts, such as basket weaving, candle making, grapevine wreath construction and much more. At their booth, several MG volunteers were available to answer gardening questions and hand out information on a variety of garden subjects.



The Master Gardeners also donate their time to help with the planting and upkeep of the Exchange Place garden. They grow a variety of plants that would have been planted during the 1850s in the way a farmer of that era might have grown them. Great care is taken to keep the garden as authentic as possible.

I listened as visitors to the garden asked Master Gardener Phil Ramey questions about how the vegetables were grown and harvested. Phil can really captivate an audience! Not only did he explain how to harvest the asparagus and pick the kale, he told stories about how early farmers protected their gardens from wild animals intent on ruining their crops. It's hard to imagine how difficult it must have been to keep all those animals out of the garden in the 1850s.

Today we still have some of the same challenges. A visit to this wonderful historic farm will make you appreciate all the modern conveniences we have for our gardens today. More information about Exchange Place can be found at their website at www.exchangeplace.info/.



Learn How To Grow Fruits and Nuts

Dr. David Lockwood will present a talk on "Fruits and Nuts in the Home Garden" on November 17, 2011 at 7:00 PM at the Johnson City Power Board. Dr. Lockwood will use a power point presentation to show what kinds of fruits and nuts are most suitable for gardeners in Northeast Tennessee.

Dr. Lockwood earned his Ph.D. from UGA and joined the faculty of the University of TN Plant and Soil Sciences in 1973. He currently has split faculty appointments, to the University of Georgia, as well as the University of Tennessee, where he serves as Extension Fruit and Nut Crops Specialist. He has travelled and lectured extensively throughout the United States as well as in many foreign countries (France, Italy, Spain, etc) and is recognized as a grape specialist and wine connoisseur.

Register Now for the Tennessee Horticulture Exposition

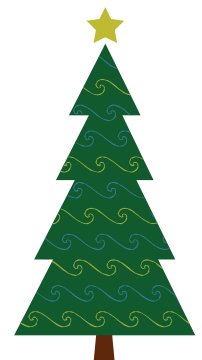

Blending Summer Flowers into Fall

Taken from *Southern Living Magazine*

As summer transitions into fall, do your flower beds and borders begin to lose some of their vibrancy? Do brown, tan and rust become the dominating colors? Try planting some of flowers listed below to help make a more colorful transition from summer to fall in southern flower beds. The ones with a star are perennials and may still be planted this fall. All others are annuals and should be planted next spring as soon as the danger of frost is past.

Gold to yellow:

- *Bur Marigold (*Bidens Polylepis*)- 3" x 3" – full sun
- *Maximillian Sunflower (*Helianthus maximilliani*) – 9" x 2.5' – full sun
- *Giant pale yellow sunflower – (*Helianthus giganteus*) – 9' x 5' – full sun
- *Yellow Lantana – (*Lantana camara*) – 1' x 3' – full sun
- *Gold moneywort – (*Lysimachia nummularia aurea*) – 1" – 1.5" – full sun/part shade
- *Firework Goldenrod – (*Solidago rugosa*) – 4' x 4" – full sun

Purple to pink:

- *New England Aster – (*Aster novae-angliae*) – 3' x 4' – full sun
- *Raydon's favorite aster –(*Aster oblongifolius angustatus*) – 3' x 2' – full sun
- *Pink turtlehead- (*Chelone lyonii*) – 3' x3' – full sun/part shade
- *Ageratum – (*Eupatorium coelestinum*) – 2' x 4' – full sun/part shade
- *Mexican sage brush – (*Salvia leucantha*) – 3' x 3' – full sun

Join The Gold Leaf Club

To become a member of this club, a Tennessee Master Gardener need only enter online reports for 100 hours of volunteer service in a given calendar year by December 31 of the calendar year. For every 100 volunteer hours reported in a given year, that member will be awarded a gold leaf lapel pin symbolizing their significant contribution to the TMG program.

Members reporting 100 - 199 hours will receive one pin and a certificate suitable for framing listing the number of volunteer hours donated and reported by the cut-off date. Members reporting 200 - 299 hours will be awarded two pins and one certificate. So many of our members contribute significant time to the program, we are glad to have this vehicle in place for recognizing them.

Please note that hours reported after the specified cut-off date will not count towards Gold Leaf awards. This is meant to encourage everyone to report their hours in a timely fashion so that the data will be available to UT and TSU by mid-to-late January of any given year for the prior calendar year. County Extension Agents will make every effort to award pins and certificates of recognition by early February so that Master Gardeners may wear their new Gold Leaf pins to Winter School.

For 2011, the Gold Leaf Club pin will be our own leafy-T emblem from Tennessee Master Gardener literature. In subsequent years the pins will be representations of the leaves of the following trees, one for each of the years 2012 - 2015: tulip poplar, golden oak, maple, and redbud.

Tennessee Master Gardeners are an amazing group of remarkably giving persons. We look forward to seeing many gold pins on lapels this coming February when they will be awarded. Please remember that your hours of service become even more valuable when entered online in a timely fashion.
