### Vegetable Varieties and Practices for Southern Appalachian Gardens

Dr. R. Allen Straw, Area Specialist in small fruits and specialty crops with Virginia Cooperative Extension, will speak on "Vegetable Varieties and Practices for Southern Appalachian Gardens." on Thursday, **March 17**, at 7 pm at the Memorial Park Community Center (Johnson City Senior Center) 510 Bert Street, in Johnson City. In this program Dr. Straw will discuss vegetable varieties that perform well in our region & best garden management practices to achieve a bountiful harvest.

Allen was raised on a diversified grain and livestock farm in East-Central Illinois. He graduated from Berea College in 1985 with a B.S. degree in general agriculture. He then earned an M.S. and a Ph.D. in Plant and Soil Sciences at the University of Tennessee. After 13 years of employment with the Tennessee Agricultural Experiment Station, Allen served 5 years as the statewide commercial vegetable and strawberry specialist for the University of Tennessee Agricultural Extension Service. Now employed by VCE and stationed at the SW VA Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Glade Spring, VA, he conducts applied research in vegetable and berry crops in the Southern Appalachian Mountains. Allen continues to work with numerous vegetable growers across east Tennessee. He is a highly respected and knowledgeable plant scientist who is not afraid to get his hands dirty.

## **Rick Darke to Present Programs in Northeast Tennessee**

Renown horticulturist, landscape designer, author and photographer, Rick Darke, whose books include *The American Woodland Garden* and *The Living Landscape: Designing for Beauty and Biodiversity in the Home Garden* (coauthored with Doug Tallamy) will present programs at two public events in Northeast Tennessee on March 21 and 22.

On **Monday, March 21, 2016**, Johnson City Public Library will host "An Evening with Rick Darke & Amy Fahmy" at the Carnegie Hotel at 1216 West State of Franklin Road in Johnson City, TN from 5:30 to 8:00 p.m. The event will feature a conversation with Darke facilitated by Fahmy, Lead Horticulturist at Sitework Studios in Asheville, NC and lead designer of the pollinator gardens at both the JCPL and Natural History Museum at the Gray Fossil Site.

General tickets to the event are \$50 and may be purchased by calling the JCPL at 423-434-4450 or online at [www.jcpl.net](http://www.jcpl.net). A limited number of special event tickets are available for \$100 and include VIP seating and a meet and greet with Rick Darke prior to the main event. Wine and hors d'oeuvres are included with all ticket prices. After the event Darke will be available for a signing of his book *The Living Landscape: Designing for beauty and biodiversity in the home garden*. The book will be available for purchase at a special event price.

Proceeds from the Johnson City Public Library event will benefit the pollinator garden on the front lawn of the Library. Through the month of March, visitors can sponsor a plant found in the pollinator garden and they will be invited to celebrate the completion of the garden in the spring at a "Garden Party." Pictures of available plants are located in the Galleria and the price to sponsor is on a tag beside each picture.

"An Evening with Rick Darke & Amy Fahmy" is sponsored by J&W Landscapes, ETSU Departments of Art and Design, Sociology and Anthropology, the Center for Community Outreach, Pollination Project: "What's the Buzz," the Office of Sustainability, Siteworks Studios, Friends of the Johnson City Public Library and Southern Appalachian Plant Society.

On **Tuesday, March 22**, the East Tennessee State University and General Shale Natural History Museum and Visitor Center at the Gray Fossil Site is hosting a special evening with this expert on living landscapes. At 6 p.m., Rick Darke will give a presentation titled "Collision or Collusion? Culture, Ecology, Landscape." You can expect stunning photographs and a thoughtful discussion exploring the places where human culture and native ecologies meet. Afterward, Darke will be available for a meet-and-greet and book-signing.

Also during the evening, the museum will present plans for a pollinator garden designed by Sitework Studio of Asheville, NC which will be located in front of the main building. The garden will include plants from the Miocene Epoch, to which the Gray Fossil Site fossils date. Guests are encouraged to sponsor a plant to be purchased for the new "living landscape" pollinator garden at the museum. The Southern Appalachian Plant Society (SAPS) is cohosting the event.

## Excellent Plants for Shade Gardens

Horticulturist Jason Reeves, will present "Excellent Plants for Shade Gardens." on Thursday, **April 21**, at 7 pm, at Johnson City Power Board Building Auditorium on Boones Creek Road (Hwy 354.) in Jonesborough. With beautiful photography Jason will display an exuberant array of shade plants. He will focus on colorful foliage, both evergreen and deciduous, while also highlighting how your shade garden can flaunt flowers year-round.

As a special bonus for SAPS members only Jason will present a second program, "Gardens of England" from 4-5 pm at the same location.

A rising star in the world of horticulture, Jason Reeves is noted for his plant knowledge, creative designs and engaging style. A contributing editor to Fine Gardening magazine, Jason currently serves as the research horticulturist and curator of the UT Gardens Jackson, located on the grounds of the West Tennessee Ag Research and Education Center. There he creates the various seasonal horticultural displays, conducts research on herbaceous and woody ornamentals, and has spearheaded many projects, including the creation of a Certified Tennessee Arboretum and the development of a Southeastern Regional Conifer Display Garden. His colorful plant combinations and unique garden art, made by recycling everyday objects, draw thousands of people to the research center's annual Summer Celebration, voted a "Top 20 Event" by the Southeast Tourism Society. In the fall Jason creates an elaborate fall display at the center using more than 5,000 pumpkins, gourds and winter squash comprising over 90 varieties he grows each year. He is much in demand as a speaker and leads numerous domestic and international garden tours.

A native of west Tennessee, Jason Reeves received his Master's degree in Ornamental Horticulture and Landscape Design from University of Tennessee Knoxville. Before coming to the UT Gardens, Jason worked at the Opryland Conservatories, the Missouri Botanical Garden and the famed Longwood Gardens. He has also worked as a horticulturist at the Palomia Gardens in New Zealand.

## Exchange Place Spring Garden Fair

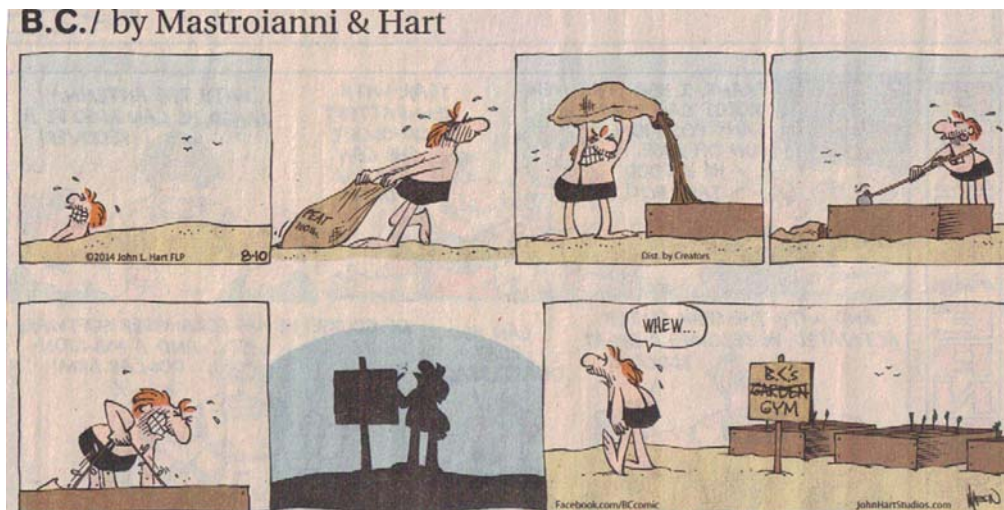
The 32nd annual Exchange Place Spring Garden Fair will be held Saturday, **April 30**, from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m. and Sunday, **May 1**, from 12 - 5 p.m. at Exchange Place Living History Farm, 4812 Orebank Road in Kingsport, Tennessee. The oldest garden fair in the region and a favorite among gardeners, the event will feature thousands of plants for sale - perennials, annuals, trees and shrubs - with the emphasis on herbs, natives and heirloom plants (including a wide variety of heirloom tomatoes), along with garden related arts and crafts. The Fair is also an educational and family event that fills the grounds and buildings of the historic site, and gardening experts in specific topics and Master Gardeners will be on hand to answer home gardening questions throughout the weekend. Heritage breeds of animals and the spring activities on a mid-1800's farmstead will be featured as volunteers shear the sheep, spin and weave the wool, cook over the hearth, and shape iron over the forge. Children's activities abound as volunteers help children create garden crafts and learn gardening skills, and area 4-H groups show their animals. Ol' timey music and traditional foods add to the atmosphere.

The Fair strives to be as environmentally friendly as possible with recycling, composting, and re-using. Visitors are encouraged to bring their own plant carriers and to bring used nursery pots (quarts and larger) for reuse.

To help gardeners reduce their water bills, Rain Barrel Kits will be available for \$40 (check or cash) throughout the weekend. The 55 gallon food grade plastic barrels (which can be painted as desired) may be assembled into a finished rain barrel on site in less than 30 minutes or the kit and instructions may be taken home to complete.

Spring is just around the corner and forsythia will be blooming soon. This is the signal the soil

temperature is warming up and weeds like crab grass and goosegrass will be germinating. Just as forsythia blooms, you should apply a pre-emergent to prevent these unwanted grasses in the lawn and garden. It is best to apply these just before a rain to insure activation of the active ingredient.

# How We Found Out That I Have Lyme Disease...From A Tick Bite

I live in Tennessee. I was recently diagnosed with Lyme Disease.

It was after a month of “weird” symptoms, several trips to the doctor, and several rounds of tests, that they finally realized that Lyme Disease was the reason for all of my recent ailments. Lyme Disease was actually the last thing they tested for.

I’m one of the lucky ones. Typically people go through upwards of 20 doctors and years of wrong diagnoses and treatments before they are accurately diagnosed with Lyme Disease.

## My Symptoms

My symptoms were typical to those experienced by others with Lyme Disease in some ways, but not in others.

Here’s what I started experiencing — out of the blue — one morning:

- **Massive aches and pains in all joints** — mostly feet and neck, and to a lesser degree my hands (fingers). It was so bad in my feet that it was *very* hard to walk. And so bad at my neck that I couldn’t turn my head to the right or left, up or down; the muscles were so tight leading to a stiff neck like I’ve never experienced before.
- **Fever**
- **Swelling** in my ankles, hands, wrists, and feet.
- **Every single lymph node in my body was sensitive** to touch, and those areas just ached all the time — without being touched.
- **Every single muscle in my body ached** for no reason.
- A weird **sensitivity on various places of my scalp**. NOT a headache though. It’s as if the pain was from the inside out, but you didn’t notice it until you touched it on the outside.
- **Inner ear pain**. It was as if I had water in my ears, plus there was a minor ache way inside all the time.
- My **throat was very red**, but it wasn’t sore.
- **Numbness** that came & went on my last 3 fingers on each hand (fingertips only), as well as the last 3 toes on each foot (tips only). Plus, the tips of my ears felt tingly and numb most of the time.
- Complete **lack of energy** — partly due to the pain. Partly due to just feeling fatigued and frustrated that no one could find a reason for all of my aches and pains.

## Other symptoms that began to appear a week or so later...

- **Weight loss for no reason**. This continued even while I was on Prednisone for nearly a month, and Prednisone is supposed to make you *gain* weight.
- A **crazy fast heartbeat** that comes and goes. Once I went off the Prednisone, this symptom pretty much went away.
- **Constant ringing in the ears**. This one continues to this day. It starts the moment I wake up. I was also noticing a greater sensitivity to loud or high-pitched sounds.

## The Meds I’ve Tried

Remember, Lyme Disease was the last thing they tested for. At first, we weren’t sure if my symptoms were the result of something viral, bacterial, or what — so the doctor put me on 2-week course of Antibiotics and Prednisone (mostly for the swelling I think). I quickly realized it was the Prednisone that was having the biggest effect because I took it in several doses throughout the day. And I knew when it was getting time for another dose, because my body would start to tighten up and get sore again.

## How I'm Feeling Today

It's still very early... it's only been about 2 months since my symptoms first started. But at this point, I'm only dealing with 4 main symptoms and I've have no meds in my system at all for the past 2 weeks:

- **Neck pain at the base of the scalp**... which goes along with the scalp sensitivity all over... which goes along with the swelling in my face, neck, and head .And the deep inner ear pain is still there.
- My **eyesight seems to be getting worse**.
- Another new symptom: **headaches!** We're talking round the clock here.
- **Difficulty concentrating** — like I'm in a daze. I'm feeling **quite forgetful**. All of these things just lead to even more **fatigue and frustration**. The symptoms are never the same from one day to the next.

Unfortunately, these symptoms seem to be getting increasingly worse, so I guess it's time for another visit to the doctor. This time it will be a specialist, at my doctor's recommendation (a rheumatologist). Plus, I'm thinking I don't want to go too long without some form of treatment for the Lyme Disease anyway.

## More About The Onset Of Symptoms

One of the strangest things about Lyme Disease is that the symptoms are rarely the same for any 2 people diagnosed with the disease. It usually doesn't present itself in the form of visible symptoms until many months — if not years — after you get the tick bite that infects you. Couple this with the fact that you can actually test “negative” for Lyme Disease for months or years, *despite* the fact that you have Lyme Disease in your body just waiting to make its grand appearance in your life.

Lyme Disease is an auto-immune disease. That is, a disease where the immune system attacks the person's own organs. This happens when something confuses the immune system.

## Some of The Doctor's Early Theories

Despite the fact that my tests kept coming back negative for each of these, some of the things my doctor thought could be going on were:

- Strep Throat
- Rheumatic Fever brought on by strep
- Rheumatoid Arthritis
- Mono
- Thyroid

I didn't tell anyone about my symptoms until after I got the diagnosis, because I didn't want others to (unintentionally) scare me with symptoms and diagnoses that they were familiar with, or that they've heard others have experienced. Or maybe something they've read about this or that. Instead, I wanted to rely 100% on the doctor at this point.
