

Start Thinking About Your Next Gardening Project

At the end of each of our articles, we tell readers how to ask us questions. Here are some that we've had that may be helpful for planning your next garden project.

Q: We have a fairly steep slope in our backyard - it has some haphazardly planted bushes, azalea, crepe myrtle and mostly mulch from the previous owners. I would like to plant with a low maintenance ground cover. It receives full sun. Any suggestions?

A: The University of Tennessee Extension/Tennessee State University Publication W874-B has information for you. We searched the document for the words "ground cover" and found several listings. This is a useful document as it lists the many landscape plants that do well in Tennessee as well as specific plant information to fit your garden needs.

As with any garden, groundcover or otherwise, there is some maintenance involved in keeping your gardens looking nice (weed-free). Once your ground cover plants are established, keep an eye out for weeds and tree sprouts that can get out of hand if this area is neglected. And always follow the planting directions that are (hopefully) included with your plants.

Q: We need a consultation regarding a place in our front yard that wish to develop into a wildflower/natural area.

A: There are some great pollinator gardens in the area you could visit. One is a relatively small butterfly garden and wildflower area at the Tipton Haynes State Historic Site on South Roan St. The gardens are located near the entrance to the Welcome Center. The wildflower garden is located in the parking lot.

Another pollinator garden is located at the Hands On! Discovery Museum/Gray Fossil Site in Gray. Ask the person at the front desk if you can just visit the garden unless you want visit the museum. There may be a small charge for this but the garden is relatively large and has many varieties of butterfly attracting native plants. The museum/fossil site is interesting as well. Visiting these gardens may give you some ideas on what you would like to see in your garden.

Both gardens are certified monarch butterfly waystations.
