#### Wildlife Weekend at Steel Creek Park

Come out to the Nature Center at Steel Creek Park for the Wildlife Weekend on Saturday, October 11, from 10am to 4pm and earn some CEU hours. The native plant and pollinator gardens there are Master Gardener projects maintained by both Sullivan, TN and Washington County, VA chapters. There will be workshops presented on Saturday by Washington County Master Gardeners on: bee houses, monarchs, pollinators, and winter sowing. The Wildlife Weekend runs from Sat., October 11 to Sun., October 12 and also has many other activities including hiking trails, nature crafts, and an amateur photography contest. Bring your family to enjoy an autumn day in the park and earn some CEUs. Details about workshop schedules will be listed at a later date. There is a \$2.00 parking fee per car at the entrance gate.

# "Featured Project" – Discovery Garden at the Hands-On Museum in Gray

The Discovery Garden is located at the Gray Fossil Site and the Hands On! Discovery Center. NETMGA adopted this project in January 2021 before the garden area was open to the public. The Hands On! Discovery Center Discovery Garden is approximately 10,000 square feet of native shrubs, trees, grasses, flowering perennials, and vines. It serves as a sustainable pollinator garden and a learning experience for the 90,000 visitors to the museum each year. The garden formally opened in May 2022 and was certified as a Monarch Butterfly Waystation that same year.

Many of the plants in the garden are identical to or in the same family as ones that existed at this site over 4 million years ago. Our Master Gardeners enjoy a great relationship with the museum staff and coordinate plantings with them to ensure that any new plants are representative of plant fossils found on the site. Our volunteers typically meet Friday mornings and on other days for special projects and events

We are continuing to help the Gray Fossil Site with maintenance of the water fountain near the museum entrance, addition of landscaping around the main entrance sign, and maintenance of the rock display also near the entrance to the museum. We have also added more water lilies, water irises, and hyacinths to the fountain. We hosted arborist Ed Sheffy of RowanTree Service in March of this year to show us the latest techniques in tree and shrub pruning. We have also harvested seeds from the garden and conducted a seed viability program with garden visitors.

Priorities in maintaining the garden are:

- Relevance to the paleontological history of the site
- Inspiring wonder and creating drama through the use of texture, size, fragrance, and color of the plants in the garden
- Maintaining a habitat for insects, birds, and small mammals and modeling sustainable gardening practices
- Maintaining a "community of plants" for museum guests to enjoy
- Sharing our knowledge of these plants with the museum visitors and summer camp youth, as well as conducting garden tours during museum events

*Meadowscaping* (published 2025-06-14) By Kate O'Lenic, Master Gardener

Meadowscaping is applying the principles of a meadow to your landscape. It's very much like returning a grass lawn back to a natural state. Meadows are a mixture of about 50% grasses and 50% flowers, both perennials and annuals. Native plants are used to ensure success and provide the best resources to pollinators.

There are quite a few benefits for homeowners and nature when lawn is converted to a meadow. Meadows require very little maintenance once established. There is no need for fertilizers, pesticides or herbicides. No weekly mowing and no watering are required. That saves money and time. You'll also get to enjoy the beauty of a succession of flowers and the winter color and movement of native ornamental grasses.

The benefits to nature are impressive, too. Meadows work hard. The plants infiltrate and filter stormwater, store carbon, return nutrients to the soil, build soil through breaking down over time, and provide food, protection and shelter for animals and other plants.

Choose a location with the plants in mind. Many meadow plants thrive in full sun with good soil drainage. If you only have part sun and wet areas for the meadow, make sure your plant selections will grow in those conditions. You can start small with a patch of lawn. That way you can see what works best in your location and what you like best about the meadow. Then you can expand your site a bit at a time.

# **Growing My First Filler Plants**

I've been growing all kinds of flowers in my gardens for over 20 years, but I've never grown any filler plants to go with them. This season I picked three to try and learned a lot from the experience!

After doing seed research online, I discovered that most of the best filler plants are easy to grow from seed. Many seed companies have interesting varieties available. I really liked the looks of the Celosia plants at Johnny's Seeds best and chose three types to try: Celosia Sylphid (light lime), Celosia Ruby Parfait (dark purple) and Celosia Sunday Mix (a combo of red, yellow, and orange).

I started all of these plants from seed in the grow room under lights in March and after hardening off, planted them outside in early June in full sun. Because these were going to be tall, up to four feet, I needed to have a good support system in place. Since I was only growing twelve of each plant in a small garden space, I chose to plant each of the three varieties in two rows of six plants each with stakes at each end and garden string around each group of twelve at two heights – 12" and 36". That made it easy to slide the string up if I needed more height. These plants got liquid fertilizer every two to three weeks and they all grew stick straight with big fluffy heads!

One of the things I love about these plants besides being beautiful: they're clean in a vase. They don't dirty the vase water and combine beautifully with my Alstroemerias, Coneflowers, Zinnias, Rudbeckias, Salvias, Roses, Garden Phlox, and Peony's in a vase and in the garden. The Celosias also last at least 10 days in a vase. And for those who have pets, they are non-toxic to cats or dogs.

Another excellent feature of Celosias is you can easily dry and use them in dried flower arrangements or added to wreaths. The process is easy to do at home.



You need to cut the stems in the morning after the dew has evaporated and before it starts to get hot. Choose mature flowers that haven't set seed yet. Cut the stems long enough for your vases and gather bundles of no more than eight stems at a time to allow for good air circulation. Use a sturdy rubber band to tie them together. (The plants are going to shrink as they dry, and the rubber band will shrink with them.) Remove the leaves below the rubber band; they can often cause mold. Hang the bundles upside down in a warm, dry, dark location. Keeping them in the dark will help preserve the flower colors better. I keep a fan on in my grow room and the lights out to help dry my flowers faster. The flowers will dry in two to three weeks and will be ready for arrangements!
