

A Totally Honest 5-Step Guide to Weeding Your Garden (2026-08-29)

Here is the ultimate, totally unscientific 5-step guide to surviving—and maybe even enjoying—the great backyard weed war.

Step 1: Suit Up Like a Video Game Character

Before you step outside, you have to dress for battle. You can't just walk out there in your nice Master Gardener green t-shirt. You need to unlock your inner garden warrior.

Find the oldest, ugliest, most beat-up sneakers in your closet—the ones that are basically held together by duct tape and hope.
